Then we send an email to the principal of each school on the list, introducing Boys & Girls Clubs of Central Florida and the 21st CCLC program. We also tell the principal that any students attending that private school who normally would have attended OCPS Academic Center for Excellence are eligible to attend the Levy-Hughes 21st CCLC program. We include a link to the 21st CCLC webpage of Boys & Girls Clubs of Central Florida's website, where the principal or any interested parents can go for additional information. This email encourages the principal or interested parents to contact the 21st CCLC Project Director and/or the Levy-Hughes Club's Service Director, providing contact information for both. Interested parents are also directed to the OCPS Find Your School App on the OCPS homepage to determine if their home address qualifies their child for this service. 21st CCLC staff will independently verify that the student's home address is in the school zone after the principal and/or parents have contacted them. Once it has been determined that the student qualifies, the parents will be invited to come to the Levy-Hughes Club for a tour and to register their student as a Club member and a 21st CCLC participant.

b) The number of students enrolled in private schools who have been identified as eligible to benefits under the program.

We don't have an exact number. In early August we reach out to principals at local private schools to invite them to the program, so, it is still too early to tell how many we will have enrolled for the upcoming grant year. Levy-Hughes Branch welcomed 12 private school students into their 21st Century program this current year.

Year-round, Boys & Girls Clubs of Central Florida's (BGCCF) Levy-Hughes Branch 21st CCLC serves 167 at-risk downtown Orlando youth (K-8) attending OCPS Academic Center for Excellence (ACE). Program operates 176 days afterschool, 16 hours/week. 34 summer days, 55 hours/week. Multi-Tiered System of Supports addresses individualized student needs, activities target 3 objectives—academic success, good character/citizenship. healthy lifestyles; helping students overcome barriers to education/employment, social/emotional challenges, health issues. 21st CCLC goal: Students improve ELA, Math, STEAM academic skills to state standards while strengthening abilities to make healthy choices regarding risky behaviors. college/career readiness, fitness/nutrition. All academic/personal enrichment activities held at Club. Parents/guardians have opportunities to improve parenting skills, develop financial literacy skills. 3.2.a. COMMUNITY NOTICE. On 7/23/18 BGCCF notified Orange County community of intent to provide 21st CCLC program at Levy-Hughes (L-H) Club / OCPS Academic Center for Excellence (ACE) through following: 1) Intent to Apply posted in L-H Club for members and parents to read; 2) Posting on currently functioning BGCCF website (www.bgccf.org) 21st CCLC webpage; 3) Posting on BGCCF's Facebook page on 8/4/18; 4) meetings with partners, stakeholders, OCPS ACE principal, OCPS, Club parents; and 5) email letter to all Orange County private school principals. Within 2 weeks of submission, copy of approved application grant narrative will be available to community on BGCCF website's 21st CCLC webpage, a comprehensive platform for information dissemination pertaining to all BGCCF-operated 21st CCLC programs. Parents and community members will be able to view a copy of grant proposal at L-H Club upon request. During first week of 2018-19 school year, flyers will be given to OCPS ACE administrative staff/teachers for distribution to students/parents., directing them to BGCCF website 21st CCLC webpage where documents will be posted/available for inspection. 3.2.b. NEEDS ASSESSMENT. Demographics/Risk Factors. Parramore neighborhood in Downtown Orlando is low income, high crime with 95.41% minority population. This inner city community is

located in Orange County's highest poverty zip code; 245% of all Parramore families with children under age 18 live below poverty level. Concentrated poverty puts whole neighborhoods, especially children, at risk. At targeted partner school—OCPS Academic Center for Excellence (ACE) PK-8 Title I school first opened Aug. 2017—100% of students are eligible for free/reduced school lunch.3 At L-H Club, 84% of all members' families have annual household incomes under \$30,000.4 Average 2018 Metropolitan Orlando area family income was more than double at \$62,900,5 Children living in poverty are more likely to start at a deficit. They enter 1st grade with vocabularies half the size of higher-income peers and by end of 3rd grade their lack of basic literacy skills begins to hurt their ability to learn other subjects. 1 in 6 children who cannot read proficiently in 3rd grade fails to graduate high school on time, a rate 4 times greater than that for proficient readers. Youth living in poverty tend to score lower on tests, are more inclined to drop out of school and are less inclined to pursue higher education. 7 27% of Parramore adults ages 18-24 do not hold even a high school diploma.8 Assessment of risk factors, including levels of poverty, unemployment, violence, academic underachievement, clearly show need for a 21st CCLC in this community. Afterschool Services. BGCCF's L-H Club is sole provider of positive youth development afterschool services in Downtown Orlando/Parramore. Prior to 2017 L-H Club opening, BGCCF served this community for nearly 30 years—since 1992 at Downtown Branch (first Boys & Girls Club to serve homeless youth in US), since 2000 at Parramore Club Teen Center. Need for Proposed Services. Neighborhood environment during childhood has been proven a key determinant of a child's long-term success. In a recent Harvard University study, Orange County, FL-where Downtown Orlando/Parramore is located-ranks as the 4th

toughest place in the entire US for poor children to escape from poverty. Low-income children who grow up in Orange County communities like Parramore will earn average 27% less than youth with similar family income levels who grow up in nation's best areas for upward mobility. Higher levels of poverty, crime and single-parent households, as well as poor performing schools, are barriers to upward mobility for youth growing up in a community like Parramore, where these risk factors impede opportunities for success.9 100% of Parramore youth live in a high crime environment, where 11.5% of all 2017 arrests were juveniles. In comparison, 2017 Orange Co. juvenile crime arrest rate was 9%.¹⁰ Another negative factor: 60% of L-H Club members come from single-parent homes. 11 In 2017-18, OCPS ACE PK-8 was among the lowest performing schools in Orange County Public Schools (OCPS) district. According to 2018 FSA English Language Arts (ELA) School Results for OCPS ACE, 80% of 3rd graders and 84% of 8th graders scored within 2 bottom testing levels, indicating they have NOT attained proficiency in that subject. Math results were equally poor, with 71% of 3rd graders and 87% of 8th graders falling to achieve proficiency. 12 On 2018 Statewide Science Assessment, 85% of all OCPS ACE 5th graders and 8th graders failed, scoring achievement levels of 2 or less; 62% of OCPS ACE 8th graders also scored 2 or less on 2018 Civics EOC Assessment,13 Community Resources. As result of extensive needs assessment conducted by school district, OCPS ACE was built in 2016-17 to provide continuum of care for Parramore youth, from preschool through school day to afterschool, Campus partners include L-H Club, Rosen Foundation Preschool, UCF. Valencia College, and City of Orlando. Closing Gaps in Services. With L-H Club next door to school, Club staff is able to work hand-in-hand with school administrative/teaching staff daily, to

address collaboratively students' academic/behavior issues. Principal Ivory supports our proposal and has committed to share students' I-READY diagnostic assessments with our 21st CCLC FLcertified afterschool teachers. We will use individualized student needs assessments to craft a responsive Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) program that will, among other things, utilize specialized I-READY ELA and Math curricula for Tier III support to improve academic and personal development. Needs Assessment Consultation. Longevity and central location in the community have afforded us opportunities for constant communication with parents, OCPS, local private schools, and Orlando/Parramore community leaders. BGCCF's 21st CCLC Senior Project Director (SPD) has been working with Principal Ivory and key staff throughout summer to identify student needs and align proposed 21st CCLC services with those needs. Our SPD has contacted eligible private schools regarding proposed 21st CCLC program; speaking with any who have responded to gather views about student needs, potential program ideas to address needs. Datadriven assessment of community needs along with extensive conversations with stakeholders led us to identify youth at OCPS ACE as being in jeopardy of educational failure. 3,3 DISSEMINATION PLAN. BGCCF's website (www.baccf.org) will provide 21st CCLC program information to participating students, parents and general public. 21st CCLC-dedicated webpage is currently built and functioning on website. This site is updated at least once a month during 21st CCLC's project period and date of latest update is displayed on webpage. This website will offer: 1) copy of approved grant narrative with program description; 2) ongoing progress in meeting 21st CCLC program's proposal goals and objectives through links to all formative/summative reports as available; 3) 21st CCLC location, target school, scheduled service hours, and Center Coordinator contact information; 4) links to student-created projects/products. Website will be maintained by BGCCF's Asst. Director of Marketing & Communications. Project Director will share best/promising practices from educational data demonstrating program success with Asst. Director of Marketing & Communications for replication statewide throughout year via BGCCF communications collateral (e.g., quarterly newsletter, annual report, periodic E-blasts, Facebook)

and distributed to stakeholders, including local area's targeted non-public/public schools, law enforcement, faith-based organizations, current/future community-based partners, and funders. This will ensure our community network of stakeholders, target population and families are informed about importance of 21st CCLC program. Program notices/information will be targeted in and to Downtown Orlando/Parramore community where L-H Club is located. For example, flyers regarding 21st CCLC Calendar of Activities/Events will be posted at Club and OCPS ACE. Special consideration/accommodation will be provided whenever possible to students/family members with limited English proficiency to ensure they understand and have access to information. We will also provide program information to target school administrative/teaching staff, OCPS school district personnel and members of 21st CCLC Advisory Board. The 21st CCLC name will be displayed prominently in L-H Club and OCPS ACE, and included on all disseminated informational/public awareness materials. 3.4 TARGET POPULATION, RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION. Targeted School. L-H Club will serve students living in Downtown Orlando/Parramore neighborhoods who attend OCPS Academic Center for Excellence (ACE), a PK-8 school with a D school grade in 2017 and 100% of students eligible for free/reduced lunch. L-H 21st CCLC program will serve 167 students—137 in grades K-5, 30 in grades 6-8—yearround, with school year/summer programs. Students served will be reflective of our 2018 L-H Club member: 51% boys, 49% girls; 77% African-American, 12% Hispanic, 7% Multi-Racial, 2% Caucasian, 1% Haitian, 0.5% Asian-American, 0.5 Native-American; 60% from single-parent households; 100% live in high crime area; 84% of families have annual household incomes of \$30,000 or less. Children who attend L-H Club and OCPS ACE live in a community with vast income equality (median income for Orlando is \$58,400.14 First opened in 2017, OCPS ACE is among lowest performing schools in OCPS district, with students scoring poorly in ELA, Math. Science and Civics. It is these low performing students our L-H Club 21st CCLC program will target. Special Needs. Project Director holds a Masters in Ed. Varying Exceptionalities. With 18

years' experience in education field, she specializes in aiding and assisting students with special needs. Our Global Reading and Math Teachers will be certified ESE teachers. All student programming is designed to support different learning styles, not limited to students with an IEP. EP or 504 Plan. PBL Projects include hands-on activities, small group instruction, direct instruction. Our Collaboration Liaison will support ESE families throughout and attend student's Annual Review meeting as requested. Eligible Students. L-H 21st CLCC will identify eligible students attending OCPS ACE utilizing school's I-READY individualized student needs assessment data. MTSS academic programming, from Tier I homework help to Tier III intensive academic support, will be provided along with additional PBL-based personal enrichment activities. Targeted students will receive program components appropriate for their grade levels. Recruitment & Retention. Because L-H Club is on OCPS ACE campus right next to school, L-H Club staff-in particular Club Service, Program and Teen Directors-has developed a strong partnership with OCPS ACE administrative and teaching staff. BGCCF's 21st CCLC Senior Project Director (SPD) has worked closely with L-H Club Service Director and OCPS ACE Principal, Ms. lvory, on all aspects of planned 21st CCLC programming/processes. Students most in need of academic assistance will be targeted/identified based on school assessments, report cards and social development history. Referrals will go through 21st CCLC Site Coordinator, who will work directly with each student as well as their teacher and student's family to ensure smooth enrollment process. Family Engagement. Families are engaged through specialized programming based on needs and are encouraged to participate in introductory Open House, 21st CCLC Program Review and Parent-Teacher Conferences, where students share recent projects and successes. Attendance Strategies. The L-H 21st CCLC program will encourage all students to remain in program the full day and attend regularly by offering array of hands-on, interactive and engaging PBL-based personal enrichment activities that Site Coordinator has specifically developed around expressed student interests. Although these activities often appear as all fun and games they also offer students something important—meeting their need for caring guidance.

supporting academic success, helping them develop as leaders of strong character, providing opportunities to increase college/career knowledge, improving health/well-being. Club staff and 21st CCLC teachers will discuss program benefits with all parents to encourage attendance. following-up with parents on student absences of more than 2 days. Proposed L-H Club 21st CCLC program will help youth develop sense of connection/belonging to increase student retention rate. Because youth know Club is a safe place that offers fun activities, they are eager to attend, benefitting from programming that will help them develop qualities and skills needed to plan great futures. This is Boys & Girls Clubs' 5 Key Elements for Positive Youth Development in action: 1) a safe and positive environment; 2) fun/sense of belonging; 3) supportive relationships: 4) opportunities & expectations; 5) recognition. These 5 Key Elements, developed by Search Institute, provide Clubs with strong foundation on which staff can build a developmentally rich Club Experience for members. It's the overall Club Experience that leads to the positive impact Clubs have on youth; the more effective the Club Experience, the greater the impact on members. The Club Experience is a powerful force, inspiring members to participate regularly by developing a sense of connection to staff/Club. Continual learning is celebrated and reinforced in every interaction, activity and area of the Club. With guidance from trained youth, development professionals and educational consultants, our members make smart life choices. A 2007 Harris poll shows that caring relationships between youth and staff were identified by youth, parents and Club staff as the most crucial element of Boys & Girls Clubs' success—they were why youth came and why they stayed. At BGCCF, we believe simply keeping a child on track to graduate high school isn't enough. Academic Success-one of our priority outcomes-means so much more; our Club members need to be on track to graduate from elementary, middle and high school on time. ready for college, trade school, the military, or employment. 3.5 TIMES & FREQUENCY OF SERVICE PROVISION FOR STUDENTS AND ADULT FAMILY MEMBERS. Please see attached Program Schedules and Activity Plans. 3.6 PROGRAM EVALUATION. Independent Evaluator Identification and Qualifications: When identifying independent evaluator, BGCCF

considered important evaluation items that were relevant to proposed 21st CCLC program and that also met 21st CCLC RFP requirements. Required qualifications for evaluator included extensive 21st CCLC program evaluation experience, positive 21st CCLC client testimonials, capacity to develop and carry out grant-specific evaluation plans with timelines, personnel availability, report writing and data analysis expertise, and data collection storage capacity. D & C Education Company, LLC dba EduMatrix, a highly recommended company experienced in 21st CCLC program evaluation, has been independent evaluator for all other BGCCF 21st CCLC sites since 2013. CEO/Lead Program Evaluator for EduMatrix, Crystal Taylor, M.B.A., Ed.S. will lead evaluation efforts for this project and will also be program point of contact. EduMatrix evaluation team, consisting of Ph.D. tenured evaluation professionals and credentialed data analysis and reporting professionals, will assist in providing services. Evaluation Activities and Proposed Timeline. Conducting evaluation activities systematically using a timeline will help to inform program and stakeholders about program progress meeting grant goals and objectives throughout year in timely manner. Activities include data collection, data analysis, and reporting. Evaluation Activity #1 - Data Collection: Data will be collected in a way that does not interfere with program activities. Evaluation activities will be discussed/coordinated with Program Director to ensure they are delivered non-intrusively. Each evaluation activity will be coordinated with program stakeholders to increase effectiveness and minimize distraction. The following will be collected or conducted by evaluator for analysis in September 2018 (baseline data), January 2019 (mid-year data) and May 2019 (end-of-year data): 1) Program student data (quantitative) including demographics, enrollment, attendance, participation, assessment scores, report card grades and other relevant data; 2) Program documents (qualitative and quantitative) including student files. assessments, data collection tools, meeting minutes and scoring rubrics; 3) Interviews (qualitative) with the Program Director, Site Coordinators, Teachers, Program Staff; 4) Program observations and site visits (qualitative) including evaluator field notes from site visits, assessing student/staff performance, and personal/academic enrichment activities. Stakeholder surveys

(qualitative) completed by adult family member of student, students' school day teachers, and students participating in program will also be collected in May 2019 by evaluator for analysis. Evaluation Activity #2 and #3 - Data Analysis and Reporting: EduMatrix will analyze all data. collected by both evaluator and program to create comprehensive analysis. Baseline data will be analyzed in Sept. 2018 and Dec. 2018 for completeness and level of student performance. Results of both baseline data analyses will be provided to program so they know which areas to target and focus on. Mid-year data will be analyzed in Jan. 2019. Results of this data will be included in Mid-Year Data Report and will show whether students have made gains between baseline and mid-year time points for each grant objective. Evaluator will meet with Program Director to discuss results of Mid-Year Data Report, noting any changes needed in areas of data collection/programming. These changes, if any, will be included in Formative Summary Evaluation Report that EduMatrix will complete in March 2019 on behalf of program. End-of-year data will be analyzed in June 2019; those results will be reflected in Summative Evaluation Report, to be completed August 2019. This report will reflect program's overall annual performance. recommendations for program improvement, and reporting outcomes. Processes for Accurate Data Collection, Maintenance and Reporting. EduMatrix will meet with SPD to discuss what data needs to be collected that aligns with grant objectives, as well as how data will be collected. who will be collecting it. There will be a student survey/testing schedule, parent survey/testing schedule, report card grade collection schedule and data entry schedule created so program stays on track with data collection, entry and maintenance. EduMatrix will create internal deadlines for program so they have correct data prepared for each reporting time point. Accurate data collection will be verified by evaluator by comparing grant objectives to collected data, as well as using data collection tools (assessments and/or surveys) as guide when analyzing data. If any discrepancies are found, evaluator will immediately contact Program Director with data reliability concerns. Coordination of Evaluation Activities. EduMatrix will coordinate evaluation activities with SPD to ensure that evaluation activities do not interfere with normal flow of day-to-

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day program operations. Each evaluation activity will be coordinated with program staff, students, adult family members, and others so evaluation process is most effective. Examination of Program Impact. Evaluation design will allow for measurement of progress made towards meeting each grant objective as described above. Measurement tools that will be used to evaluate program impact include program participant data, analysis of student ELA, Math and Science assessment data and report card grades, program observations, and analysis of lesson plans and program schedules. Interviews with program staff, results of site visit reports, analysis of student data/grades, academic/personal enrichment data, review of curriculum used, adult family member participant/performance data, College and Career Readiness data (if needed) and Dropout Prevention data (if needed) will also be used as program impact measurement tools. These tools will help answer specific program impact questions through data analysis including following: 1) Did program efforts to address each core subject area result in positive outcomes for program participants? 2) Did program efforts to address College & Career Readiness (if needed), Dropout Prevention (if needed) and personal enrichment activities result in positive outcomes for program participants? 3) Did program efforts to address academic enrichment and supplementing school day curriculum in innovative ways result in positive outcomes for program participants? 4) Did program efforts to address adult family members result in positive outcomes for those who participated? Using these measurement tools to answer these program impact questions through evaluation will help stakeholders understand whether program had any substantial impact in a variety of areas. Results will be used to inform program about any areas that may need improvement to positively impact program quality in future years. Use of Evaluation Results, Sharing Results with Community. Using evaluation data results, and sharing those results to help improve program and its impact, is an important part of the evaluation plan. A true learning community can be fostered through data sharing for purposes of student and adult family member achievement/improvement. Evaluation results will be shared at Advisory Board meetings, staff meetings, program leadership meetings, adult family member workshops and events, and with

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OCPS ACE principal at least 2 times during grant year. Data results, program operations and evaluator recommendations for program improvement will be covered in these meetings so community is well aware of 21st CCLC program and student-level performance. Community/Stakeholder feedback based on evaluation data is encouraged so program can learn more about what is needed in community and assist in developing other ways to help students improve academically/socially throughout year. 3.7 APPROVED PROGRAM ACTIVITIES. L-H Club's 21st CCLC academic/personal enrichment programming will serve 167 students grades K-8 (137 Elementary, 30 Middle School) from OCPS ACE school year-round. To determine student needs from school day, Senior Project Director (SPD) met with targeted school's principal over past several months. Principal Ivory suggested sharing participating students' I-READY diagnostic assessments to help 21st CCLC Teachers better develop individualized Instructional plans for students by highlighting skills where each is having difficulty, recommending instructional materials starting at student's current skill level to allow for skills building/mastery. Teaching staff also wanted 21st CCLC program built using Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) to maximize individualized instruction, since school can only provide this in limited amounts, especially Tier III supports. Our Approved Program Activities utilize MTSS design to promote academic/behavioral success of all 21st CCLC students. Program design will empower students with academic/ social/behavioral skills they'll need to successfully engage in school now, and better prepare them to complete education/training to enter workforce successfully. We will provide Tier I instruction and support to all 21st CCLC students through Homework Hero/Homework Assistance programs. All students will participate in Homework Hero (HH) 60 minutes, 1 day/week, with additional 30 minutes of Homework Assistance daily, totaling 3.5 hours of homework help per week afterschool. In HH, each student will receive goal-tracking punch card. When all holes have been punched, they gain HH status. To get 1 hole punched students must: 1) have homework daily; 2) apply ample effort to complete homework; 3) request help when needed; 4) offer assistance to others ONLY when they have completed their own homework; 5) read silently when

homework is complete to allow others to reach Hero status. Teachers will have ready supply of interesting, age-appropriate reading material for those without homework. Those who complete homework more quickly than others will be encouraged to assist peers/younger students. We will provide Tier III intensive instruction and support in ELA and Math to all 21st CCLC students. Instruction will be individualized based on students' I-READY diagnostic assessment, provided by targeted school with parental permission to 21st CCLC teachers. These assessments will provide teachers with instructional plan highlighting skills each student's academic weaknesses, recommending instructional materials starting at student's current skill level to allow for skills building/mastery. I-READY diagnostic tools will serve as strong bridge between school day and 21st CCLC afterschool programming. Intentional smaller staff to student ratio will allow for rigorous Tier III instruction with maximum impact. Our 21st CCLC program will help students advance ELA and Math skills by providing curricula that incorporate the Florida Standards in a creative learning experience, such as Activity Plans #1 & #2: The Flat Stanley Project and Flat Stanley's Worldwide Adventure: The Amazing Mexican Secret/Framed in France, While teaching vocabulary development and phonemic awareness to grades k-1, Flat Stanley will also teach students in grades 2-3 about analyzing text structure, in grades 4-5, about summarizing and synthesizing, and in grades 6-8, about reading around text. Students will also benefit from access to Activity Plan #3: Speech Recognition Technology to facilitate foreign language learning. This technology combines real-time speech-to-computer screen recognition, visual aids, professional recordings to accommodate different learning styles while also teaching about foreign cultures. Technology enhances learning by reintroducing content at longer and longer intervals to improve long-term retention. ELA activities are offered 60 minutes weekly during afterschool, 60 minutes daily during summer. ELA activities support 2 objectives: 1) 70% of regularly participating students will improve to a satisfactory English Language Arts grade or above, or maintain a high grade across the program year (Flat Stanley = Academic Benchmark Activity), and 2) 75% of regularly participating students will increase their performance on Study Island Assessment for ELA

Standards across the program year. For Math instruction L-H Club 21st CCLC will utilize Activity Plan #4: Math Masters, to help students improve ability to learn/retain higher order math skills without being distracted by having to remember math facts. Math Masters activities will cover basic addition, subtraction, multiplication and division skills over grades K-8. L-H Club's program will also have Activity Plan #5: a Global Math Program that combines cultural studies, math and science using a DNA Data Math Lesson. Teachers will use their own DNA data results from websites such as Ancestry.com to create real world problems for students that align with Florida Standards skills. Younger students will learn how to identify circles/squares as whole units while older students will learn about fractions as equal parts of a whole. This DNA Data Math Lesson will provide students who have difficulty understanding mathematical concepts and solving problems with alternative resources to accommodate different learning styles, making use of graphs, charts and color-coded word problems to provide concrete materials and other ways to experience concepts of whole, half, fourth. We will also offer a complementary math activity that teaches students how to operate a sewing machine. Math activities are offered 60 minutes weekly afterschool, 60 minutes daily summer. Math activities support 2 objectives: 1) 70% of regularly participating students will improve to a satisfactory mathematics grade or above, or maintain a high grade across the program year (Math Masters = Academic Benchmark Activity), and 2) 75% of regularly participating students will increase their performance on Study Island Assessment for Mathematical Standards across the program year. Science/STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math) programming will be provided as Tier II instruction. incorporating Project-Based Learning (PBL) as integral part of program plan. With Activity Plan #6: Mad Science, leading science enrichment provider, will help students use hands-on activities to explore the Human Body and body systems. Every class includes take-home project so learning can continue beyond the classroom. Our Club's STEAM programming will provide a multi-disciplinary academic enrichment program, applying technology to an array of academic concepts in modules aligned with Florida Standards. Using PBL-based methodology, this

programming will introduce students to basic scientific precepts such as methodical approaches to problem-solving, developing hypotheses and record-keeping. Activity Plan #7: STEAM Programming for grades 6-8 focuses on learning computer coding to work within video game environments; learning about cameras and artistic principles of photography; understanding how humans hear sound to construct a song in Garage Band. In Activity Plan #8: STEAM Global Science (Engineering Component), teams of students grades K-8 will use 3-D Printers, 3-D Cubic Landmark Puzzles, Solar Panels and a functioning water feature to create a scale model of a Global City. Science/STEAM activities support 2 objectives: 1) 75% of regularly participating students will improve to a satisfactory science grade or above, or maintain a high grade across the program year (Mad Science = Academic Benchmark); and 2) 75% of regularly participating students will increase their performance on Study Island Assessment for Science Standards across the program year. Other Enrichment Activities. Students will participate in personal enrichment activities offered on rotating basis as Tier II instruction Mon.-Thurs., with extra afterschool hour on Wednesdays and regular hours on Fridays focusing on specialized activities such as Music Lessons (Steel/African Drums, Piano, Ukulele), Lego Club, Fitness Club, Computer Club for grades K-5. Grades 6-8 will focus on Music Engineering, You Tube Creation. Web Design, Health & Fitness Club. All personal enrichment activities will provide youth with tools needed to build confidence/self-esteem/critical decision-making skills while improving fitness. ELA and Math skills will be practiced/reinforced with Activity Plan #9: Financial Literacy (College & Career Readiness). Financial Literacy will teach students how to make spending decisions age-appropriately. Grades K-2 learn how to analyze simple alternatives. Grades 3-6 learn how to divide allowance into a spending plan. Grades 7-8 practice developing effective spending plans. Arming students with strong financial skills will improve their ability to achieve success, personally and in the workplace. We will incorporate HEPA Standards with Tier II instruction using Activity Plan #10: Boys & Girls Clubs' Triple Play: A Game Plan for Mind. Body and Soul. Developed by BGCA in collaboration with US Dept. of Health & Human Services.

Triple Play takes holistic approach, showing youth how learning to eat right, keep fit and engage in positive relationships is the winning combination. Triple Play programming for all grades will focus on Zumba, Yoga, Dance, Soccer; grades 6-8 will also have opportunity to work with Personal Trainer. Triple Play grades K-5: up to 2 hours weekly afterschool, 2 hours daily in summer; grades 6-8: up to 2.5 hours weekly afterschool, 2 hours daily summer. Physically active youth who have a healthy diet are more likely to perform well in school, maintain academic success, improve self-esteem. Activity Plan #11 will include Boys & Girls Clubs' nationally acclaimed Drug and Violence Prevention programming, SMART Moves (Skills Mastery and Resistance Training). Each module targets age and/or gender-specific risk factors promoting drug prevention, positive self-image, strong morals/ethics and individuality. Students will also participate in ongoing character development activities using Character Lab, a program that teaches students how to develop character strengths. L-H 21st CCLC program will begin at OCPS ACE school with hot meal served to students in school cafeteria, then move to BGCCF's L-H Branch for all academic/enrichment programming, year-round, 701 W. Livingston St., Bldg. 900, Orlando, FL 32805. Both facilities are in compliance with all federal, state and local health/safety and accessibility standards, including ADA. OCPS ACE campus includes a preschool in addition to K-8, community health clinic, athletic fields and parking garage. It is situated between Amelia and Livingston Streets and Parramore and Westmoreland Avenues on nearly 4 city blocks. There is sufficient space within 30,300 sq. ft. L-H Club facility to provide comprehensive 21st CCLC program to 167 youth. Downstairs students can access Multi-Purpose Room, Computer Lab, Art Room, Café, Garden Patio; upstairs they can access Computer Lab, College & Career Center, Multi-Purpose Room, Dance Studio, Art Room, Music Studio. There are 2 Kitchens, one on each Club level, and stage downstairs for performances. Outside students will have access to athletic fields and an amphitheater art/performance space. License/Exemption. Our L-H Branch does NOT provide child care of any kind. This Boys & Girls Club provides only positive youth development services. We have letter of exemption from DCF licensing. Our other 3 2016-21 grants operate with similar exemptions, 3.11 SAFETY & STUDENT TRANSPORTATION. Student Safety. After school, check-in takes place in OCPS

ACE's cafeteria. Holiday/Summer—check-in takes place at L-H Club. Students in activities based at school are escorted by staff after breakfast. Throughout year all participating youth must check in with 21st Membership Secretary, who will sign them in using Club 21st CCLC sign in sheet or NFocus tracking software (scan cards). At day's end, parents of car riders are required to come into the Club or notify Club staff in writing or by phone to sign their children out. Parents must complete L-H's written permission form to allow students to walk home. Parent-approved walkers are escorted/monitored as they leave facility. All visitors for 21st CCLC program must report directly to Club's front desk, where they must sign in/out on visitor registry and have ID checked. During winter months when sun sets earlier, student safety is ensured by proper illumination of both building exteriors/parking lots to ensure all students are able to access and leave each facility safely. Student transition from one activity to next takes place under Club Service Director's direction and will be made in same manner as current Club activity rotations. All students will be supervised by 21st CCLC Site Coordinator, Club Service Director, Club Program Director, certified Teachers, and PA's to ensure safety. Full-time and part-time Club staff are well trained and will participate in continuing professional development. Many hold CPR/First-Aid-certifications with face-to-face; there will always be at least 2 certified staff members on site. For students' safety. all 21st CCLC personnel hired will meet all hiring/licensing requirements set forth by BGCCF and grant. All 21st CCLC program employees, all other Club employees and all volunteers must undergo DCF Clearinghouse & Level 2 background screening. Crisis Management/Emergency Response Plan drills are conducted monthly. Emergency contact lists are kept on file for each participant. Off-site activities require 1:10 ratio. Students will never be left alone during trips, and standard safety procedures include: (1) buddy system; (2) regular head count (visual and verbal), and (3) training in symptoms of heat exhaustion/heat stroke. When school is in session, their afternoon begins with a meal provided at the OCPS ACE cafeteria (3:00-3:30pm) then directly after all students are escorted by staff to the Club, a two minute walk, to complete homework with 21st CCLC Teachers and Program Assistants (PA's) who provide Tier I support throughout (3:30-4:00pm). Students transition for an hour of each session (4:00pm and 5:00pm) between activity rooms downstairs (youth, K-5) and upstairs for middle school (6-8th grade) as well as the gymnasium when appropriate for their activity. All academic instruction and personal enrichment takes place at the Club each day after school (as well as holidays and summer). During these 2nd and 3rd program hours, Mon.-Thurs., students will receive a broad array of Tier I, II and III programming with appropriate supports, based on grade level and gender to best meet ratios and balance within the program model. All programs rotate daily. Students are closely monitored by PA's who are assigned to them along with other support staff, all of whom assist in maintaining quality supervision, transitions and staff-student ratios. Tier I instruction will be provided during each students' additional HH hour as it is a direct reflection of school day work provided by the day school teacher. Tier II instruction will include STEAM academic enrichment programming as well as personal enrichment programming that has academic skills learning and practice embedded within. Tier III instruction will offer individualized, rigorous ELA and Math small-group teacher table instruction of no more than a ratio of 1:10 in grades K-8. All 2nd and 3rd hour programming will be supervised by Service & Program Directors, Site Coordinator, Teachers and PA's. When qualified Contractors are used, Teachers and/or PA's are always present to maintain a 1:10 ratio.

RFP 3.9 Staffing and Professional Development

Tier III instruction will offer individualized, rigorous ELA and Math small-group instruction. Staff to student ratios of 1:10 for grades K through 8 will be maintained for both the youth and middle school groups.

Academic enrichment staff employed at the Levy-Hughes Branch 21st CCLC program will be Florida DOE Certified Teachers and all Paraprofessional Program Assistants will hold at least an Associate's degree.

RFP 3.10 Facilities

The Levy-Hughes facility is in located on the campus of OCPS ACE in downtown Orlando, in the Historic Parramore Heritage Neighborhood. The Club is co-located with the K-8 school buildings, a pre-K facility, Orange Blossom health clinic, Children's Home Society's Community School Director, school social workers, counselors, and other partner agency representatives. The campus is meant to provide a full-service, holistic community school setting complete with wraparound services for the children and families of Parramore.

ACE is a zoned school, and is meant to serve the many youth and tweens in the downtown area in their own neighborhood. In 1971, this community lost its local elementary school and for decades the local children, who are predominantly African-American, were bused out to 8 different elementary schools and 4 different middle schools sites in an effort to desegregate local school populations. The purpose of OCPS ACE is to provide a neighborhood school in Parramore under the Community School Partnership© model.

The vast majority of the students and our Club members are walkers. The younger ones arrive on foot or are dropped off by their parents in car since their homes are within one mile of the school. The older ones walk or bike. Likewise, they go home on foot, bike or are picked up by their parents.

RFP 3.12c Sustainability

The program's Advisory Board meets twice per school calendar year.

By working with stakeholders in the public sector, in Parramore and downtown Orlando, with OCPS and other major contributors to the ACE school, our Advisory Board will stay abreast of additional funding sources and methods to sustain programming through in-kind services and funding opportunities. Our goal is to utilize the Advisory Board's diverse group members to engage and interface with a variety of potential supporters from various sectors which will naturally broaden our ability to access different revenue sources and/or in-kind contributions.

Furthermore, the agency itself has a robust and diverse fundraising plan. Once BGCCF commits to providing a program or initiative which enhances the quality and breadth of services available to the underserved youth in our community, we also commit to seeking the ongoing funding necessary to assure its long-term viability. We will continue to work diligently to seek funds from a variety of government, foundation, and corporate sources as opportunities present themselves, and to expand our fundraising activities in order to increase our donor base.

In addition, we continue to work strategically to increase our internal fundraising capabilities to assist with the higher costs we know we will encounter now and in the future as a result of this program expansion. Our Development team has been working to increase our base of individual and corporate donors. They now focus on one premiere fund-raising event annually, our Celebrate The Children Dinner & Auction. In addition, Development focuses on support and implementation of our Annual Campaign, which includes: 1) cultivation, solicitation, and stewardship of individual donors; 2) implementation of the *Benevon Model* (formerly *Raising More Money*) throughout our four-county service area; 3) development of year-round point of entry opportunities; and 4) management of a variety of ask events. As a result, we hold five Faces of the Future fund-raising breakfasts every year, one in each county we serve and one corporate event. The costs for these breakfasts are underwritten by a major sponsor, so all dollars raised go directly to our programs. Many of our key supporters, like the Advisory Board, are instrumental in inviting potential donors to these events and thus helping BGCCF develop resources for the 21st Century program.

By working with stakeholders in public sector, such as City of Orlando, OCPS, and private sector with corporations such as Hughes Supply, and nonprofits, including local churches, Heart of Florida United Way, Orlando Magic Youth Fund, BGCCF and L-H Club are involved in major youth services initiatives throughout Orlando/Orange County. Development/fundraising team along with BGCCF Branch Board members work to increase individual donor base in County and diversify Club's revenue sources. We regularly seek government, corporate and private foundation funding. BGCCF is utilizing a comprehensive resource development strategy to diversify revenue streams and increase individual giving using a Board-driven face-to-face ask strategy. This strategy offers viable options for continued sustainability of 21st CCLC programs. BGCCF opened Thrift Store (2016) to generate additional revenue stream for direct services provided at its 21 traditional (non-school site) Clubs. BGCCF organizational goals include doubling number of donors from 1,000 to 2,000; increasing Club Connection tours; increasing number of participants at annual fund-raising breakfasts; developing focused strategy to increase online giving. Another strategic initiative goal: increase current board giving and implement strategy to increase number of Jeremiah Milbank Society members (\$10,000+). BGCCF has had a strong presence in Orlando for nearly 30 years, originally with Downtown and Parramore Clubs, now combined into new L-H Club. During these 3 decades BGCCF has developed a solid track record, establishing

strong partnerships to support programming it offers. These substantive partnerships will bolster sustainability of 21st CCLC programming in years 3-5.

This year (2019), our Levy-Hughes Club was selected to take part in a three-year pilot program with the Wallace Foundation in their Youth Arts Initiative. Through this program grant, we have been able to draw additional fine art and performing arts resources to this Club. On staff, we have two part-time teaching artists (fine arts and dance) who are lending their time and expertise to our Club members during 21st Century time.

We will offer 5 1-hour parental workshops and 2 two-hour workshops: 1) two 2-hour parent workshops provided by educator Tammy Speed-Hefner, Lead OCPS Mental Health Counselor: 2) two one-hour - Learn about STEAM educational based STEAM learning apps and gadets that can both support your child encourage hands-on exploration within each discipline presented by Full Sail. 3) Mobile Services will provide one (1) 1-hour Financial Literacy workshop exclusively for parents of 21st CCLC students, covering the topics found to be most interest to parents from FY 2019-2020 21st CCLC parent workshops: taxes and tax forms, credit scores and how they affect your buying power, and general financial planning. 4) two Health and or Fitness Presentations such as CPR or Health Nutritious activities for parent health informational opportunities.

Reason(s) for the change: Programmatic and grant year changes

L-H Club's 21st CCLC academic/personal enrichment programming will serve 167 students grades K-8 (137 Elementary, 30 Middle School) from OCPS ACE school year-round. To determine student needs from school day, Senior Project Director (SPD) met with targeted school's principal over past several months. Principal Ivory suggested sharing participating students' I-READY diagnostic assessments to help 21st CCLC Teachers better develop individualized instructional plans for students by highlighting skills where each is having difficulty, recommending instructional materials starting at student's current skill level to allow for skills building/mastery. Teaching staff also wanted 21st CCLC program built using Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) to maximize individualized instruction, since school can only provide this in limited amounts, especially Tier III supports. Our Approved Program Activities utilize MTSS design to promote academic/behavioral success of all 21st CCLC students. Program design will empower students with academic/social/behavioral skills they'll need to successfully engage in school now, and better prepare them to complete education/training to enter workforce successfully. We will provide Tier I instruction and support to all 21st CCLC students through Homework Hero/Homework Assistance programs. All students will participate in Homework Hero (HH) 60 minutes, 1 day/week, with additional 30 minutes of Homework Assistance daily, totaling 3.5 hours of homework help per week afterschool. In HH, each student will receive goal-tracking punch card. When all holes have been punched, they gain HH status. To get 1 hole punched students must: 1) have homework daily; 2) apply ample effort to complete homework; 3) request help when needed; 4) offer assistance to others ONLY when they have completed their own homework; 5) read silently when homework is complete to allow others to reach Hero status. Teachers will have ready supply of interesting, age-appropriate reading material for those without homework. Those who complete homework more quickly than others will be encouraged to assist peers/younger students. We will provide Tier III intensive instruction and support in ELA and Math to all 21st CCLC students. Instruction will be individualized based on students' I-READY diagnostic assessment, provided by targeted school with parental permission to 21st CCLC teachers. These assessments will provide teachers with instructional plan highlighting skills each student's academic weaknesses, recommending instructional materials starting at student's current skill level to allow for skills building/mastery. I-READY diagnostic tools will serve as strong bridge between school day and 21st CCLC afterschool programming. Intentional smaller staff to student ratio will allow for rigorous Tier III instruction with maximum impact. Our 21st CCLC program will help students advance ELA and Math skills by providing curricula that incorporate the Florida Standards in a creative learning experience, such as Activity Plans #1 & #2: The Flat Stanley Project and Flat Stanley's Worldwide Adventure: The Amazing Mexican Secret/Framed in France. While teaching vocabulary development and phonemic awareness to grades k-1, Flat Stanley will also teach students in grades 2-3 about analyzing text structure, in grades 4-5, about summarizing and synthesizing, and in grades 6-8, about reading around text. Students will also benefit from access to Activity Plan #3: Speech Recognition Technology to facilitate foreign language learning. This technology combines real-time speech-to-computer screen recognition, visual aids, professional recordings to accommodate different learning styles while also teaching about

foreign cultures. Technology enhances learning by reintroducing content at longer and longer intervals to improve long-term retention. ELA activities are offered 60 minutes weekly during afterschool, 60 minutes daily during summer. ELA activities support 2 objectives; 1) 70% of regularly participating students will improve to a satisfactory English Language Arts grade or above, or maintain a high grade across the program year (Flat Stanley = Academic Benchmark Activity), and 2) 75% of regularly participating students will increase their performance on Study Island Assessment for ELA Standards across the program year. For Math instruction L-H Club 21st CCLC will utilize Activity Plan #4: Math Masters, to help students improve ability to learn/retain higher order math skills without being distracted by having to remember math facts. Math Masters activities will cover basic addition, subtraction, multiplication and division skills over grades K-8. L-H Club's program will also have Activity Plan #5: a Global Math Program that combines cultural studies, math and science using a DNA Data Math Lesson. Teachers will use their own DNA data results from websites such as Ancestry.com to create real world problems for students that align with Florida Standards skills. Younger students will learn how to identify circles/squares as whole units while older students will learn about fractions as equal parts of a whole. This DNA Data Math Lesson will provide students who have difficulty understanding mathematical concepts and solving problems with alternative resources to accommodate different learning styles, making use of graphs, charts and color-coded word problems to provide concrete materials and other ways to experience concepts of whole, half, fourth. We will also offer a complementary math activity that teaches students how to operate a sewing machine. Math activities are offered 60 minutes weekly afterschool, 60 minutes daily summer. Math activities support 2 objectives: 1) 70% of regularly participating students will improve to a satisfactory mathematics grade or above, or maintain a high grade across the program year (Math Masters = Academic Benchmark Activity), and 2) 75% of regularly participating students will increase their performance on Study Island Assessment for Mathematical Standards across the program year. Science/STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math) programming will be provided as Tier II instruction, incorporating Project-Based Learning (PBL) as integral part of program plan. With Activity Plan #6: Mad Science, leading science enrichment provider, will help students use hands-on activities to explore the Human Body and body systems. Every class includes take-home project so learning can continue beyond the classroom. Our Club's STEAM programming will provide a multi-disciplinary academic enrichment program, applying technology to an array of academic concepts in modules aligned with Florida Standards. Using PBL-based methodology, this programming will introduce students to basic scientific precepts such as methodical approaches to problem-solving, developing hypotheses and record-keeping. Activity Plan #7: STEAM Programming for grades 6-8 focuses on learning computer coding to work within video game environments; learning about cameras and artistic principles of photography; understanding how humans hear sound to construct a song in Garage Band. In Activity Plan #8: STEAM Global Science (Engineering Component), teams of students grades K-8 will use 3-D Printers, 3-D Cubic Landmark Puzzles, Solar Panels and a functioning water feature to create a scale model of a Global City. Science/STEAM activities support 2 objectives: 1) 75% of regularly participating students will improve to a satisfactory science grade or above, or maintain a high grade across the program year (Mad Science = Academic Benchmark); and 2) 75% of regularly participating students will increase their performance on Study Island Assessment for Science Standards across the program year. Other Enrichment Activities. Students will participate in personal enrichment activities offered on rotating basis as Tier II instruction Mon.-Thurs., with extra afterschool hour on Wednesdays and regular hours on Fridays focusing on specialized activities such as Music Lessons (Steel/African Drums, Piano, Ukulele), Lego Club, Fitness Club, Computer Club for grades K-5. Grades 6-8 will focus on Music Engineering, You Tube Creation, Web Design, Health & Fitness Club.

All personal enrichment activities will provide youth with tools needed to build confidence/selfesteem/critical decision-making skills while improving fitness. ELA and Math skills will be practiced/reinforced with Activity Plan #9: Financial Literacy (College & Career Readiness). Financial Literacy will teach students how to make spending decisions age-appropriately, Grades K-2 learn how to analyze simple alternatives. Grades 3-6 learn how to divide allowance into a spending plan. Grades 7-8 practice developing effective spending plans. Arming students with strong financial skills will improve their ability to achieve success, personally and in the workplace. We will incorporate HEPA Standards with Tier II instruction using Activity Plan #10: Boys & Girls Clubs' Triple Play: A Game Plan for Mind, Body and Soul. Developed by BGCA in collaboration with US Dept. of Health & Human Services, Triple Play takes holistic approach, showing youth how learning to eat right, keep fit and engage in positive relationships is the winning combination. Triple Play programming for all grades will focus on Zumba, Yoga, Dance, Soccer; grades 6-8 will also have opportunity to work with Personal Trainer. Triple Play grades K-5: up to 2 hours weekly afterschool, 2 hours daily in summer; grades 6-8: up to 2.5 hours weekly afterschool, 2 hours daily summer. Physically active youth who have a healthy diet are more likely to perform well in school, maintain academic success, improve self-esteem. Activity Plan #11 will include Boys & Girls Clubs' nationally acclaimed Drug and Violence Prevention programming, SMART Moves (Skills Mastery and Resistance Training). Each module targets age and/or gender-specific risk factors promoting drug prevention, positive self-image, strong morals/ethics and individuality. Students will also participate in ongoing character development activities using Character Lab, a program that teaches students how to develop character strengths. Students will learn about WOOP (Wish, Outcome, Obstacle, Plan), a self-control strategy for achieving goals. Our youth development programs have received highest rating, Strong Evidence of Effectiveness, from National Dropout Prevention Center. Summer program will continue MTSS framework with Civics theme. providing intensive Tier III ELA/Math/Science academic support to reduce potential "Summer Skills Slide," each subject offered 1 hour/grade daily. ELA, Math and STEAM skills will be reinforced throughout Tier II instruction in specialized activities such as Making Soap, Atoms & Molecules, Kiddynomics, Bill of Rights, Constitution, Swimming, Robotics, Arts. All summer Tier II instruction offered 1 hour/grade daily. Activity Plan #12: Adult Family Education will offer 21st CCLC students' parents minimum 1 parent involvement activity/month during school year and 1 activity during summer, each activity 60-90 minutes. Sept.: Parent Orientation; Oct.: Parent Open House with Dr. Margo Blake ("How to Make the Most out of Parent-Teacher Conferences"); Nov.: Parents learn hands-on activities to make reading come alive; Dec.: Full Sail shows parents educational toys to support/encourage children's hands-on exploration of STEAM disciplines; Jan.: Parents learn about impact of latest tax changes on their returns; Feb.: Orange Blossom Family Health discusses "African Americans and their Risk of Heart Disease/Stroke"; March: UCF Certified Psychologists discuss "How to Deal with your Child's Anger and Stressors that Cause Anger;" March: Mad Science instructs parents in hands on science activities that align with K-5 Science Standards; April: UCF Certified Psychologists present "Coping with High Stakes Testing" (for parents of students Grades 3-8) and "Preparing Young Students for High Stakes Testing" (for parents of students Grades K-2); May: "Ways to Prevent Summer Slide" (UCF Certified Psychologists) with Global Year End Presentation.

Student programming design supports different learning styles, not limited to students with IEP, EP or 504 Plan. PBL Projects include hands-on activities, small group instruction, direct instruction. Global Reading/Math Teachers will be certified ESE teachers. We will obtain/maintain copies of ESE students' current IEP's, EP's or 504 documentation to best meet learning needs. Ongoing accommodations within program will include proximity control, frequent breaks,

rephrasing questions, additional support with use of program staff and visual schedule representation of steps to complete desired lesson. Collaboration Liaison will support ESE families throughout program. While variety and creativity of L-H Club's 21st CCLC programming will keep younger students coming back, middle school program structure will particularly **encourage continued attendance** from students grades 6-8. Students will have daily access to Homework Hero day school studies assistance, with access to OCPS Attainment computer-based curriculum, to recover failing grades and/or assignments not completed during school day. Middle school students will also be able to make program choices, selecting from among 3 academic enrichment areas M-TH, including 8 Global Studies core classes. L-H Club Teen Director will oversee student choices using Passport of Participation Program to track, monitor, reward students with a stamp each week showing they attended all core content classes. If students get all passport stamps they'll be able to attend STEM programs on Wed. and Fri.—Music Engineering, YouTube Creation, Web Design. Teen Director will carefully monitor students' needs, offering decision-making guidance when required.

In addition, Levy-Hughes 21st CCLC program will be offering the following enrichments for grades K-5 this year: basketball, performing arts, Zumba, global/fine arts, music arts, global fashion, soccer and financial literacy. For grades 6-8, we will offer: science/STEM (Mad Science), computer science enrichment, cosmetology, global cuisine and culinary career extensions, yoga and financial literacy.

Middle school receives an hour content of math through Study Island, whose assessment and delivery of math prepares them for the FSA. They also receive one hour fitness per day and one hour science content, STEM, FSA content Florida standards each week.

One hour reading

<u>Tuesday and Thursdays there will be two hours of cosmetology, fine arts, dance, computer science and culinary, called the different "houses" so that each middle school student can find their passion.</u>

Cosmetology is a new addition that blends art, career development and entrepreneurship. Basic hair care, braiding techniques, coloring techniques, skin care and feeds this age group's self-esteem. Math is also employed in measuring, mixing and applying as well as chemistry/science component with mixing chemicals. Science and Math Teachers are in the classes. The Teachers are presenting strengthening those math and science skills such as symmetry, volume, measurement, chemical reactions and much more. Long-term students have the option to finish with certificate.

Entrepreneurship

Dontaye West continues to teach culinary arts and healthy eating habits. As well as life skills in the kitchen. His culinary career extensions will teach middle school 21st Century students the types of careers they can have in culinary arts.

<u>Computer Science Program: Tuesdays and Thursdays – robotics, lego kits, engineering, motors and coding, taught by contractor Jeremiah Ball.</u>

Ms. Klein, Teacher 21st Century recently OCPS-retired teacher from ACE is a NASA-trained and certified teacher. She will be teaching astronautics, space, legos, robotics, and more. She also leads the Bike Club once a week on Wednesdays teaching fitness, bike safety and all the health benefits and muscle groups engaged while cycling (performed on campus with appropriate bike safety equipment).

Section: 3.9 STAFFING & PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT. 3.9.a. Staffing Plan.

Reason(s) for the change:

Annual adjustments to programming and staffing based upon the needs of our target population attending Academic Center for Excellence in downtown Orlando.

We have further specialized our paraprofessional Program Assistants to increase their knowledge of social-emotional needs of the youth we serve. The job title for our Program Assistants is now Program Counselor, with one Lead Program Counselor at each site. In addition to the youth development training that program staff receive from Boys & Girls Clubs, Tammy Speed-Hefner, Lead Mental Health Counselor for Orange County Public Schools will provide hands-on training to our frontline program staff to meet the psycho-social and social-emotional needs of the at-risk youth we serve.

In a recent community needs assessment conducted by OCPS ACE and its Cabinet of community partners revealed that "60% of students were interested in one-one-one, peer to peer and group counseling." The state-wide Marjory Stoneman Douglas Public Safety Act brought to light the importance of mental health services and mental well-being of our adolescents – we have made staffing changes to reflect the shifting awareness and gravity of those measures.

Additionally, we added one more specialized Program Assistant – the Technical Assistance Program Assistant and a Behavior Technician to support the work of our Program Counselors. This person has experience working in the mental health field.

BGCCF full-time 21st CCLC Senior Project Director (SPD) works under agency COO, responsible for direct management of all BGCCF 21st CCLC programs—including selection/hiring of teachers, data collection, and curriculum implementation/oversight—at the L-H Club site as well as 3 other 21st CCLC sites operating under 3 2016-21 BGCCF grants. SPD has M.Ed. and FL teacher certification and has worked with BGCCF's 21st CCLC Programs since 2013-14. Site Coordinator (PT/4-year degree, FL certified teacher) develops and oversees implementation of PBL project plans and other academic curricula; supervises Teachers, Foreign Language and Lead/Homework Hero Program Assistants (PA's). 21st CCLC PA's; assists with professional development activities; works with parents; provides instruction/homework assistance as needed. 21st CCLC Teachers (PT/FL certified teachers) provide students with homework assistance and all academic programming, work with parents as needed, 21st CCLC PA's (PT/2-year degree) assist teachers in homework assistance/academic programming; provide students with personal enrichment activities under supervision of Club Program Director; assist with parent/family education events, educational field trips. Lead PA/Homework Hero PA (PT/2-year degree/CPR-First Aid Certified including face-to-face) as above with added responsibility for ClassDojo classroom management/parent communication system. Foreign Language PA (PT/2-year degree/Fluency in French) implements/facilitates daily foreign language instruction using web-based learning software; assists teachers in providing educational services. Club Service Director (FT/4-year degree/CPR-First Aid Certified including face-to-face/BGCCF since 2000) develops personal enrichment curriculum with Program Director; oversees 21st CCLC operations within Club operations framework: student check-in, class transitions/dismissal; supervises Membership Secretary, student data entry; works with family/community partners; disseminates program information to community; plans/implements 21st CCLC family events (with SPD). Club Youth Program Director (FT/4-year degree/CPR-First Aid Certified including face-to face) helps develop/deliver personal enrichment instruction/activities/testing, supervises PA's for enrichment only, coordinates Friday cultural enrichment

programs. Club Teen Director (FT/4 year degree/CPR-First Aid Certified including face-to-face) helps develop/deliver Grades 6-8 personal enrichment instruction/activities/testing (with Club Director), oversees middle student class choices using Passport of Participation Program to track, monitor and reward students, provide guidance in decision-making if necessary. Collaboration Liaison (PT/4-year degree, FL certified teacher) ensures active collaboration occurs between OCPS ACE and L-H Club 21st CCLC in program planning/implementation; monitors students with D/F grades; assists with prescriptive academic program development for students not improving; administers/evaluates teacher survey; attends 21st CCLC Advisory Board meetings. Membership Secretary (FT/2-year degree) maintains all 21st CCLC student participation information on nFocus tracking software, including attendance and demographics. Secretary devotes 50% of time exclusively to 21st CCLC-related data entry.

For the 2019-20 grant year, we endeavor to further specialize our paraprofessional Program Assistants to increase their knowledge and ability to meet the social-emotional needs of the youth we serve.

The job title for our Program Assistants is now **Program Counselor**, with one Lead Program Counselor at each site. In addition to the youth development training that program staff receive from Boys & Girls Clubs, Tammy Speed-Hefner, Lead Mental Health Counselor for Orange County Public Schools will provide hands-on training to our frontline program staff to meet the psycho-social and social-emotional needs of the at-risk youth we serve.

The duties and activities of the Lead Program Counselor are as follows:

- Leads efforts in the social emotional support of 21st CCLC students.
- Attends all scheduled professional development sessions
- Schedules with support from Project Director, Service and Program Director staff development
- Communicates directly with Program Counselors and Program Assistants any and all updates as they pertain to scheduled 21st CCLC programming.
- Supports in-house testing schedule for Pre, Mid and Post Testing as outlined by 21st CCLC dates.
- <u>Prepares workspace with needed materials and supplies for daily implementation of the 21st CCLC Program.</u> (see lesson plans)
- Maintains written log of inventory items for 21st CCLC Program as supported by the Project Director, Service Director and Site / Coordinator
- Conducts meetings with Program Director for Program Counselors and Assistants for staff development and training needs. Supports data collection - SLDRT for 21st CCLC students per site.
- Supports with receiving and labeling incoming 21st CCLC inventory.
- Supports with completing inventory status when scheduled by Service Director

Roles and duties of the **Program Counselor** include:

- Provides direct services to 21st CCLC students with frequent and or escalated social emotional needs daily.
- Conduct restorative processes and procedures to resolve conflict among students and or staff
- Attend Mental Health staff developments and trainings as scheduled
- · Record and report ongoing trends with students behaviors to Lead Program Counselor
- <u>Transition 21st CCLC students and support them in class as scheduled with either 21st CCLC Teacher, Contractor and or Volunteer.</u>
- <u>Actively supervise club members in areas scheduled. Implement with fidelity our behavioral intervention plans with use of leveled systems and or club documentation</u>
- Assist with maintaining accurate attendance of assigned 21st CCLC club members in both EZ Reports and Kid Trax

- Support the implementation of rules and responsibilities within the 21st CCLC classroom and club environment.
- Support students with homework and academic lessons within the 21st CCLC classroom.

Technical Assistance Program Assistant:

- Lead all efforts in ongoing technology needs and technology inventory of the 21st CCLC program.
- Coordinate any and all efforts to resolve technology needs of the 21st CCLC program.
- Attend trainings as scheduled by Chris Timmons.
- Complete all tasks that pertain to needs and or lack of access to technology by completing and following up with all tech requests to the help desk.
- Lead ALL efforts in delivering Math Lab (software Study Island) content unless other staff members and or designated staff member are scheduled as directed by the Site Coordinator.
- Ensure that 21st CCLC devices are plugged in and charged nightly
- Transition 21st CCLC club members and support them in class as scheduled with either 21st CCLC Teacher, Contractors and or Volunteer(s)
- Actively supervise club members in areas scheduled.
- <u>Implement with fidelity the behavioral intervention plans with use of leveled systems and or club documentation.</u>
- Assist with maintaining accurate attendance of assigned 21st CCLC club members in both EZ Reports and Kid Trax
- <u>Support the implementation of rules and responsibilities within the 21st CCLC classroom and club</u> environment.
- Support club members with homework and academic lessons within the 21st CCLC classroom.

The role of the Behavior Technician is to provide support to the 21st CCLC classrooms. This can be achieved through collecting, organizing, and graphing student achievement data, as well as being a supportive figure in the classroom setting. The Behavior Tech will assist with small group and one on one instruction and implement interventions for both academics and behavior to help the students achieve their individual goals and learn new skills The Behavior Technician meets regularly with the Lead Counselor(s), Site Coordinator, Program and Service Directors and Behavior Specialist to review data and plans, and to collaborate regarding 21st CCLC classroom and individual 21st CCLC student support.

This grant year we are using Study Island for online-based math supports and assessments. Teachers are also delivering specialized tutoring in small groups, utilizing Homework Heroes or Study Island, in order for students to receive more tailored academic supports.

Recruitment, Hiring, Training. Open positions posted on Glassdoor.com, Job Inventory, Jooble, Oodle.com, Recruit.net, Simply Hired, Trovit, Twitter Jobwatch, Seminole State College, UCF, Rollins Edyth Bush Institute, Career Builder, BGCA. SPD will contact target school administrators to advertise teaching positions within their school. Resumes screened/ranked by Hirecentric or ExactHire. All 21st CCLC staff will meet all certification requirements and possess all necessary licenses required by BGCCF, OCPS, 21st CCLC. Teachers will be licensed with valid FLDOE certificate. All 21st CCLC program employees/volunteers are required to undergo annual Level II background screening and DCF Clearinghouse—FDLE and FBI fingerprint screening, background checks, drug screenings. Random drug tests conducted on ongoing basis. All employees receive BGCCF's New Hire Training and job-

specific training from their supervisor. For 21st CCLC staff, training comes from SPD, Club Service/Program Directors, and/or teachers, depending on new hire position.

Professional Development. Teachers will receive instruction on: 1) Google Docs Global Studies Program; 2) STEAM PBL, including Full Sail YouTube Course, Web Design, Music Engineering; 3) New School New Culture. WellTraveled, a project-based cross-cultural global education program, will provide 1 hour web-based PBL curriculum. 21st CCLC Advisory Board members will receive 2 SMART Board Professional Development Sessions. Site Coordinator will attend 21st CCLC Florida After School Alliance state conference.

In addition, Full Sail University will provide two (2) 6-hour sessions of STEAM PBL for our teachers' professional development. Lead OCPS Counselor Tammy Speed-Hefner will provide four (4) 1.5 hour sessions in Professional Staff Development around themes of identifying trauma and mental health risks in children and providing behavioral training to match the 21st Century grant requirements. Dr. Joy Taylor will continue providing professional staff development via the LEAD Institute for leadership and empowerment through creating a climate of learning that has a positive effect on youth behavior.

By working with stakeholders in public sector, such as City of Orlando, OCPS, and private sector with corporations such as Hughes Supply, and nonprofits, including local churches, Heart of Florida United Way, Orlando Magic Youth Fund, BGCCF and L-H Club are involved in major youth services initiatives throughout Orlando/Orange County. Development/fundraising team along with BGCCF Branch Board members work to increase individual donor base in County and diversify Club's revenue sources. We regularly seek government, corporate and private foundation funding. BGCCF is utilizing a comprehensive resource development strategy to diversify revenue streams and increase individual giving using a Board-driven face-to-face ask strategy. This strategy offers viable options for continued sustainability of 21st CCLC programs. BGCCF opened Thrift Store (2016) to generate additional revenue stream for direct services provided at its 21 traditional (non-school site) Clubs. BGCCF organizational goals include doubling number of donors from 1,000 to 2,000; increasing Club Connection tours; increasing number of participants at annual fund-raising breakfasts; developing focused strategy to increase online giving. Another strategic initiative goal: increase current board giving and implement strategy to increase number of Jeremiah Milbank Society members (\$10,000+). BGCCF has had a strong presence in Orlando for nearly 30 years, originally with Downtown and Parramore Clubs, now combined into new L-H Club. During these 3 decades BGCCF has developed a solid track record, establishing

strong partnerships to support programming it offers. These substantive partnerships will bolster sustainability of 21st CCLC programming in years 3-5.

This year (2019), our Levy-Hughes Club was selected to take part in a three-year pilot program with the Wallace Foundation in their Youth Arts Initiative (YAI). Through this program grant, we have been able to draw additional fine art and performing arts resources to this Club. On staff, we have two part-time teaching artists (fine arts and dance) who are lending their time and expertise to our Club members during 21st Century time. We continue to offer these YAI program enrichments to our middle school 21st Century students.

Reason(s) for the change: Programmatic and yearly changes to keep themes and topics engaging and interesting to participating 21st CCLC youth.

1. America: Territories, Timeline and Traditions will be the theme for this upcoming year's program to broaden UOF 21st CCLC students' perspectives, giving them a greater awareness of our country's history, present and past. UOF 21st CCLC students will improved basic academic skills while learning about a broader range of opportunities and experiences available to them. Minimal program changes are added below.

L-H Club's 21st CCLC academic/personal enrichment programming will serve 167 students grades K-8 (137 Elementary, 30 Middle School) from OCPS ACE school year-round. To determine student needs from school day, Senior Project Director (SPD) met with targeted school's principal over past several months. Principal Ivory suggested sharing participating students' I-READY diagnostic assessments to help 21st CCLC Teachers better develop individualized instructional plans for students by highlighting skills where each is having difficulty, recommending instructional materials starting at student's current skill level to allow for skills building/mastery. Teaching staff also wanted 21st CCLC program built using Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) to maximize individualized instruction, since school can only provide this in limited amounts, especially Tier III supports. Our Approved Program Activities utilize MTSS design to promote academic/behavioral success of all 21st CCLC students. Program design will empower students with academic/ social/behavioral skills they'll need to successfully engage in school now, and better prepare them to complete education/training to enter workforce successfully. We will provide Tier I instruction and support to all 21st CCLC students through Homework Hero/Homework Assistance programs. All students will participate in Homework Hero (HH) 60 minutes, 1 day/week, with additional 30 minutes of Homework Assistance daily, totaling 3.5 hours of homework help per week afterschool. In HH, each student will receive goal-tracking punch card. When all holes have been punched, they gain HH status. To get 1 hole punched students must: 1) have homework daily; 2) apply ample effort to complete homework; 3) request help when needed; 4) offer assistance to others ONLY when they have completed their own homework; 5) read silently when homework is complete to allow others to reach Hero status. Teachers will have ready supply of interesting, age-appropriate reading material for those without homework. Those who complete homework more quickly than others will be encouraged to assist peers/younger students. We will provide Tier III intensive instruction and support in ELA and Math to all 21st CCLC students. Instruction will be individualized based on students' I-READY diagnostic assessment, provided by targeted school with parental permission to 21st CCLC teachers. These assessments will provide teachers with instructional plan highlighting skills each student's academic weaknesses, recommending instructional materials starting at student's current skill level to allow for skills building/mastery. I-READY diagnostic tools will serve as strong bridge between school day and 21st CCLC afterschool programming. Intentional smaller staff to student ratio will allow for rigorous Tier III instruction with maximum impact. Our 21st CCLC program will help students advance ELA and Math skills by providing curricula that incorporate the Florida Standards in a creative learning experience, such as Activity Plans #1 & #2: The Flat Stanley Project and Flat Stanley's Worldwide Adventure: The Amazing Mexican Secret/Framed in France. While teaching vocabulary development and phonemic awareness to grades k-1, Flat Stanley will also teach students in grades 2-3 about analyzing text structure, in grades 4-5, about summarizing and synthesizing, and in grades 6-8, about reading around text. Students will also benefit from access to Activity Plan #3: Reading and Writing Activities will revolve around topics such as the Civil Rights, Women's Rights Movements and the history and meanings behind American holiday traditions. Speech Recognition Technology to facilitate foreign language learning. This technology combines real-time speech to computer screen recognition, visual aids, professional recordings to accommodate different learning styles while also teaching about foreign cultures. Technology enhances learning by reintroducing content at longer and longer intervals to improve long term retention. ELA activities are offered 60 minutes weekly during afterschool, 60 minutes daily during summer. ELA activities support 2 objectives: 1) 70% of regularly participating students will improve to a satisfactory English Language Arts grade or above, or maintain a high grade across the program year (Flat Stanley = Academic Benchmark Activity), and 2) 75% of regularly participating students will increase their performance on Study Island Assessment for ELA Standards across the program year. For Math instruction L-H Club 21st CCLC will utilize Activity Plan #4: Math Masters, to help students improve ability to learn/retain higher order math skills without being distracted by having to remember math facts. Math Masters activities will cover basic addition, subtraction, multiplication and division skills over grades K-8. L-H Club's program will also have Activity Plan #5: a Global Math Program that combines cultural studies, math and science using a DNA Data Math Lesson. Teachers will use their own DNA data results from websites such as Ancestry.com to create real world problems for students that align with Florida Standards skills. Younger students will learn how to identify circles/squares as whole units while older students will learn about fractions as equal parts of a whole. This DNA Data Math Lesson will provide students who have difficulty understanding mathematical concepts and solving problems with alternative resources to accommodate different learning styles, making use of graphs, charts and color-coded word problems to provide concrete materials and other ways to experience concepts of whole, half, fourth. We will also offer a complementary math activity that teaches students how to operate a sewing machine. Math activities are offered 60 minutes weekly afterschool, 60 minutes daily summer. Math activities support 2 objectives: 1) 70% of regularly participating students will improve to a satisfactory mathematics grade or above, or maintain a high grade across the program year (Math Masters = Academic Benchmark

Activity), and 2) 75% of regularly participating students will increase their performance on Study Island Assessment for Mathematical Standards across the program year. Science/STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math) programming will be provided as Tier II instruction, incorporating Project-Based Learning (PBL) as integral part of program plan. With Activity Plan #6: Mad Science, leading science enrichment provider, will help students use hands-on activities to explore the Human Body and body systems. Every class includes take-home project so learning can continue beyond the classroom. Our Club's STEAM programming will provide a multi-disciplinary academic enrichment program, applying technology to an array of academic concepts in modules aligned with Florida Standards. Using PBL-based methodology, this programming will introduce students to basic scientific precepts such as methodical approaches to problem-solving, developing hypotheses and record-keeping. Activity Plan #7: STEAM Programming for grades 6-8 focuses on learning computer coding to work within video game environments; learning about cameras and artistic principles of photography; understanding how humans hear sound to construct a song in Garage Band. In Activity Plan #8: STEAM Global Science (Engineering Component), teams of students grades K-8 will use 3-D Printers, and Legos to explore American Architecture and make science, art, and design observations while building models with Legos, in teams. 3-D Cubic Landmark Puzzles, Solar Panels and a functioning water feature to create a scale model of a Global City. Science/STEAM activities support 2 objectives: 1) 75% of regularly participating students will improve to a satisfactory science grade or above, or maintain a high grade across the program year (Mad Science = Academic Benchmark); and 2) 75% of regularly participating students will increase their performance on Study Island Assessment for Science Standards across the program year. Other Enrichment Activities. Students will participate in personal enrichment activities offered on rotating basis as Tier II instruction Mon.-Thurs., with extra afterschool hour on Wednesdays and regular hours on Fridays focusing on specialized activities such as Music Lessons (Steel/African Drums, Piano, Ukulele), Lego Club, Fitness Club, Computer Club for grades K-5. Grades 6-8 will focus on Music Engineering, You Tube Creation, Web Design, Health & Fitness Club, All personal enrichment activities will provide youth with tools needed to build confidence/self-esteem/critical decision-making skills while improving fitness. ELA and Math skills will be practiced/reinforced with Activity Plan #9: Financial Literacy (College & Career Readiness). Financial Literacy will teach students how to make spending decisions ageappropriately. Grades K-2 learn how to analyze simple alternatives. Grades 3-6 learn how to divide allowance into a spending plan. Grades 7-8 practice developing effective spending plans. Arming students with strong financial skills will improve their ability to achieve success, personally and in the workplace. We will incorporate HEPA Standards with Tier II instruction using Activity Plan #10: Boys & Girls Clubs' Triple Play: A Game Plan for Mind, Body and Soul. Developed by BGCA in collaboration with US Dept. of Health & Human Services, Triple Play takes holistic approach, showing youth how learning to eat right, keep fit and engage in positive relationships is the winning combination. Triple Play programming for all grades will focus on Zumba, Yoga, Dance, Soccer; grades 6-8 will also have opportunity to work with Personal Trainer. Triple Play grades K-5: up to 2 hours weekly afterschool, 2 hours daily in summer; grades 6-8: up to 2.5 hours weekly afterschool, 2 hours daily summer. Physically active youth who have a healthy diet are more likely to perform well in school, maintain academic success, improve self-esteem. Activity Plan #11 will include Boys & Girls Clubs' nationally acclaimed Drug and Violence Prevention programming, SMART Moves (Skills Mastery and Resistance Training). Each module targets age and/or gender-specific risk factors promoting drug prevention, positive self-image, strong morals/ethics and individuality. Students will also participate in ongoing character development activities using Character Lab, a program that teaches students how to develop character strengths. Students will learn about WOOP (Wish, Outcome, Obstacle, Plan), a selfcontrol strategy for achieving goals. Our youth development programs have received highest rating, Strong Evidence of Effectiveness, from National Dropout Prevention Center. **Summer program** will continue MTSS framework with Civics theme, providing intensive Tier III ELA/Math/Science academic support to reduce potential "Summer Skills Slide," each subject offered 1 hour/grade daily. ELA, Math and STEAM skills will be reinforced throughout Tier II instruction in specialized activities such as Making Soap, Atoms & Molecules, Kiddynomics, Bill of Rights, Constitution, Swimming, Robotics, Arts. All summer Tier II instruction offered 1 hour/grade daily. **Activity Plan #12:** Adult Family Education will offer 21st CCLC students' parents minimum 1 parent involvement activity/month during school year and 1 activity during summer, each activity 60-90 minutes.

Student programming design supports different learning styles, not limited to students with IEP, EP or 504 Plan. PBL Projects include hands-on activities, small group instruction, direct instruction. Global Reading/Math Teachers will be certified ESE teachers. We will obtain/maintain copies of ESE students' current IEP's, EP's or 504 documentation to best meet learning needs. Ongoing accommodations within program will include proximity control, frequent breaks, rephrasing questions, additional support with use of program staff and visual schedule representation of steps to complete desired lesson. Collaboration Liaison will support ESE families throughout program. While variety and creativity of L-H Club's 21st CCLC programming will keep younger students coming back, middle school program structure will particularly encourage continued attendance from students grades 6-8. Students will have daily access to Homework Hero day school studies assistance, with access to OCPS Attainment computer-based curriculum, to recover failing grades and/or assignments not completed during school day. Middle school students will also be able to make program choices, selecting from among 3 academic enrichment areas M-TH, including 8 Global Studies core classes. L-H Club Teen Director will oversee student choices using Passport of Participation Program to track, monitor, reward students with a stamp each week showing they attended all core content classes. If students get all passport stamps they'll be able to attend STEM programs on Wed. and Fri.—Music Engineering, YouTube Creation, Web Design. Teen Director will carefully monitor students' needs, offering decision-making guidance when required.

In addition, Levy-Hughes 21st CCLC program will be offering the following enrichments for grades K-5 this year: basketball, performing arts, Zumba, global/fine arts, music arts, global fashion, soccer and financial literacy. For grades 6-8, we will offer: science/STEM (Mad Science), computer science enrichment, cosmetology, global cuisine and culinary career extensions, yoga and financial literacy.

Middle school receives an hour content of math through Study Island, whose assessment and delivery of math prepares them for the FSA. They also receive one-hour fitness per day and one-hour science content, STEM, FSA content Florida standards each week.

One hour reading

Tuesday and Thursdays there will be two hours of cosmetology, fine arts, dance, computer science and culinary, called the different "houses" so that each middle school student can find their passion.

Cosmetology is a new addition that blends art, career development and entrepreneurship. Basic hair care, braiding techniques, coloring techniques, skin care and feeds this age group's self-esteem. 1. For the 2021-22 program year, "Identity & Diversity" will be the program theme with a goal to explore, celebrate and strengthen diversity and identities. Content will be aligned with ELA and MATH BEST standards as it is geared to aid self-image, self-improvement, while reducing subconscious and self-inflicted patterns of thoughts and behaviors that negatively impact a child's self-worth. Daily activities and lessons plans with Academic & Physical Enrichment will aim to support an authentic representation of where students are with use of data collection and the develop a growth mindset in order for students to develop habits of self-regulations and consistency to self-determined SMART goals.

L-H Club's 21st CCLC academic/personal enrichment programming will serve 167 students grades K-8 (137 Elementary, 30 Middle School) from OCPS ACE school year-round. To determine student needs from school day, Senior Project Director (SPD) met with targeted school's principal over past several months. Principal Ivory suggested sharing participating students' I-READY diagnostic assessments to help 21st CCLC Teachers better develop individualized instructional plans for students by highlighting skills where each is having difficulty, recommending instructional materials starting at student's current skill level to allow for skills building/mastery. Teaching staff also wanted 21st CCLC program built using Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) to maximize individualized instruction, since school can only provide this in limited amounts, especially Tier III supports. Our Approved Program Activities utilize MTSS design to promote academic/behavioral success of all 21st CCLC students. Program design will empower students with academic/ social/behavioral skills they'll need to successfully engage in school now, and better prepare them to complete education/training to enter workforce successfully. We will provide Tier I instruction and support to all 21st CCLC students through Homework assistance.

For the 2021-22 program year, we have chosen "Identity & Diversity" as the overarching program theme with a goal to explore, celebrate and strengthen diversity and identities. Content will be aligned with ELA and MATH BEST standards as it is geared to aid self-image, self-improvement, while reducing subconscious and self-inflicted patterns of thoughts and behaviors that negatively impact a child's self-worth. Daily activities and lessons plans with Academic & Physical Enrichment will aim to support an authentic representation of where students are with use of data collection and the develop a growth mindset in order for students to develop habits of self-regulations and consistency to self-determined SMART goals.

Hero/Homework Assistance programs. All students will participate in Homework Hero (HH) 60 minutes, 1 day/week, with additional 30 minutes of Homework Assistance daily, totaling 3.5 hours of homework help per week afterschool. In HH, each student will receive goal-tracking punch card. When all holes have been punched, they gain HH status. To get 1 hole punched students must: 1) have

homework daily; 2) apply ample effort to complete homework; 3) request help when needed; 4) offer assistance to others ONLY when they have completed their own homework; 5) read silently when homework is complete to allow others to reach Hero status. Teachers will have ready supply of interesting, age-appropriate reading material for those without homework. Those who complete homework more quickly than others will be encouraged to assist peers/younger students. We will provide Tier III intensive instruction and support in ELA and Math to all 21st CCLC students. Instruction will be individualized based on students' I-READY diagnostic assessment, provided by targeted school with parental permission to 21st CCLC teachers. These assessments will provide teachers with instructional plan highlighting skills each student's academic weaknesses, recommending instructional materials starting at student's current skill level to allow for skills building/mastery. I-READY diagnostic tools will serve as strong bridge between school day and 21st CCLC afterschool programming. Intentional smaller staff to student ratio will allow for rigorous Tier III instruction with maximum impact.

Student programming design supports different learning styles, not limited to students with IEP, EP or 504 Plan. PBL Projects include hands-on activities, small group instruction, direct instruction. Global Reading/Math Teachers will be certified ESE teachers. We will obtain/maintain copies of ESE students' current IEP's, EP's or 504 documentation to best meet learning needs. Ongoing accommodations within program will include proximity control, frequent breaks, rephrasing questions, additional support with use of program staff and visual schedule representation of steps to complete desired lesson. Collaboration Liaison will support ESE families throughout program. While variety and creativity of L-H Club's 21st CCLC programming will keep younger students coming back, middle school program structure will particularly encourage continued attendance from students grades 6-8. Students will have daily access to Homework Hero day school studies assistance, with access to OCPS Attainment computer-based curriculum, to recover failing grades and/or assignments not completed during school day. Middle school students will also be able to make program choices, selecting from among 3 academic enrichment areas M-TH, including 8 Global Studies core classes. L-H Club Teen Director will oversee student choices using Passport of Participation Program to track, monitor, reward students with a stamp each week showing they attended all core content classes. If students get all passport stamps they'll be able to attend STEM programs on Wed. and Fri.—Music Engineering, YouTube Creation, Web Design. L-H Club's 21st CCLC academic/personal enrichment programming will serve 167 students grades K-8 (137 Elementary, 30 Middle School) from OCPS ACE school year-round. To determine student needs from school day, Senior Project Director (SPD) met with targeted school's principal over past several months. Principal Ivory suggested sharing participating students' I-READY diagnostic assessments to help 21st CCLC Teachers better develop individualized instructional plans for students by highlighting skills where each is having difficulty, recommending instructional materials starting at student's current skill level to allow for skills building/mastery. Teaching staff also wanted 21st CCLC program built using Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) to maximize individualized instruction, since school can only provide this in limited amounts, especially Tier III supports. Our Approved Program Activities utilize MTSS design to promote academic/behavioral success of all 21st CCLC students. Program design will empower students with academic/ social/behavioral skills they'll need to successfully engage in school now, and better prepare them to complete education/training to enter workforce successfully. We will provide Tier I instruction and support to all 21st CCLC students through Homework assistance.

BGCCF full-time 21st CCLC Senior Project Director (SPD) works under agency COO, responsible for direct management of all BGCCF 21st CCLC programs—including selection/hiring of teachers, data collection, and curriculum implementation/oversight—at the L-H Club site as well as 4 3 other 21st CCLC sites operating under 43 2016-21 2022-2026 BGCCF grants. SPD has M.Ed. and FL teacher certification and has worked with BGCCF's 21st CCLC Programs since 2013-14. Site Coordinator (PT/4-year degree, FL certified teacher) develops and oversees implementation of PBL project plans and other academic curricula; supervises Teachers, Literacy Programming and Curriculum, Lead/Homework Hero Program Counselors, 21st CCLC PA's; assists with professional development activities; works with parents; provides instruction/homework assistance as needed. 21st CCLC Teachers (PT/FL certified teachers) provide students with homework assistance and all academic programming, work with parents as needed. 21st CCLC PA's (PT/2-year degree) assist teachers in homework assistance/academic programming; provide students with personal enrichment activities under supervision of Club Program Director; assist with parent/family education events, educational field trips. Lead Program Counselor/Homework Hero Counselors (PT/2-year degree/CPR-First Aid Certified including face-to-face) as above with added responsibility for ClassDojo classroom management/parent communication system; assists teachers in providing educational services. Club Service Director (FT/4-year degree/CPR-First Aid Certified including face-to-face/BGCCF since 2000) develops personal enrichment curriculum with Program Director; oversees 21st CCLC operations within Club operations framework: student check-in, class transitions/dismissal; supervises Membership Secretary, student data entry; works with family/community partners; disseminates program information to community; plans/implements 21st CCLC family events (with SPD). Club Youth Program Director (FT/4-year degree/CPR-First Aid Certified including face-to face) helps develop/deliver personal enrichment instruction/activities/testing, supervises PA's for enrichment only, coordinates Friday cultural enrichment programs. Club Teen Director (FT/4-year degree/CPR-First face-to-face) helps develop/deliver Grades 6-8 personal Aid Certified including instruction/activities/testing (with Club Director), oversees middle student class choices using Passport of Participation Program to track, monitor and reward students, provide guidance in decision-making if necessary. Collaboration Liaison (PT/4-year degree, FL certified teacher) ensures active collaboration occurs between OCPS ACE and L-H Club 21st CCLC in program planning/implementation; monitors students with D/F grades; assists with prescriptive academic program development for students not improving; administers/evaluates teacher survey; attends 21st CCLC Advisory Board meetings. Membership Secretary (FT/2-year degree) maintains all 21st CCLC student participation information on nFocus tracking software, including attendance and demographics and EZ Reports. Secretary devotes 50% of time exclusively to 21st CCLC-related data entry and additional 25% to other 21st CCLC related duties.

For the <u>2023-24</u> <u>2022-23</u>grant year, we endeavor to further specialize our paraprofessional <u>Program Counselors</u> and <u>Tutors</u> to increase their knowledge and ability to meet the social-emotional needs of the youth we serve. We continue to offer professional development in mental health needs of the populations we serve as well as socioemotional needs and stages of youth development.

The job title for our Program Assistants is now *Program <u>Tutor Assistants</u> Counselor*, with one *Lead Program Counselor* at each site. In addition to the youth development training that program staff receive from Boys & Girls Clubs, Tammy Speed-Hefner, Lead Mental Health Counselor for Orange County Public Schools will provide handson training to our frontline program staff to meet the psycho-social and social-emotional needs of the at-risk youth we serve.

The duties and activities of the Lead Program Counselor are as follows:

- Leads efforts in the social emotional support of 21st CCLC students.
- Attends all scheduled professional development sessions
- Schedules with support from Project Director, Service and Program Director staff development
- Communicates directly with Program Counselors and Program Assistants any and all updates as they pertain to scheduled 21st CCLC programming.
- Prepares workspace with needed materials and supplies for daily implementation of the 21st CCLC Program. (see lesson plans)
- Maintains written log of inventory items for 21st CCLC Program as supported by the Project Director, Service Director and Site / Coordinator
- Conducts meetings with Program Director for Program Counselors and Assistants for staff development and training needs.
- Supports with receiving and labeling incoming 21st CCLC inventory
- Supports with completing inventory status when scheduled by Service Director

Roles and duties of the Program <u>Tutor Assistants</u>Counselor include:

- Provides direct services to 21st CCLC students with frequent and or escalated social emotional needs daily.
- Conduct restorative processes and procedures to resolve conflict among students and or staff
- Attend Mental Health staff developments and trainings as scheduled
- Record and report ongoing trends with students' behaviors to Lead Program Counselor
- Transition 21st CCLC students and support them in class as scheduled with either 21st CCLC Teacher,

- Actively supervise club members in areas scheduled. Implement with fidelity our behavioral intervention plans with use of leveled systems and or club documentation

Technology & Data Program Assistant:

- Lead all efforts in ongoing technology needs and technology inventory of the 21st CCLC program.

This grant year we are using Study Island for online-based math supports and assessments. Teachers are also delivering specialized tutoring in small groups, utilizing Homework Heroes or Study Island, in order for students to receive more tailored academic supports.

Recruitment, Hiring, Training. SPD will contact target school administrators to advertise teaching positions within their school. Resumes screened/ranked by Hirecentric or ExactHire. All 21st CCLC staff will meet all certification requirements and possess all necessary licenses required by BGCCF, OCPS, 21st CCLC. Teachers will be licensed with valid FLDOE certificate. All 21st CCLC program employees/volunteers are required to undergo annual Level II background screening and DCF Clearinghouse—FDLE and FBI fingerprint screening, background checks, drug screenings. Random drug tests conducted on ongoing basis. All employees receive BGCCF's New Hire Training and job-specific training from their supervisor. For 21st CCLC staff, training comes from SPD, Club Service/Program Directors, and/or teachers, depending on new hire position.

Professional Development.

For the <u>2023-24</u> 2022-23 grant year, our Professional Development for 21st CCLC Teachers has changed to meet the needs of our program and focus on literacy and reading. Combined, these professional development trainings will strengthen all direct services' staff knowledge about the educational tools and techniques available to them to provide their 21st CCLC students with a more targeted and successful course of instruction. By helping participating students close their learning gaps in order to achieve academic success. All 21st CCLC staff will participate in the following professional trainings:

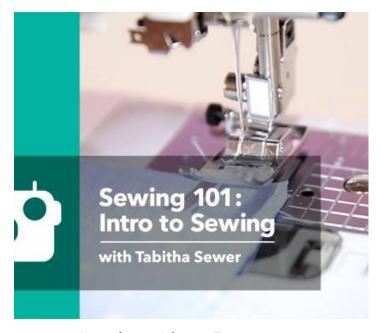

It is also important to meet with them before paying to make sure your personalities are compatible and that you will feel comfortable working with them long-term.

1. Certification

Personal fitness trainers who work in Florida are not required by law to have any certification. However, these certifications do carry weight and can make you feel more comfortable about their skill level and professionalism. Before you hire a trainer, ask if they are certified in any way, but realize that some the certification systems carry more weight than others. NOCA and NCCA are attempting to create viable credentialing and industry standards:

NOCA (National Organization for Competency Assurance), which is the most prominent, has been certifying many types of allied health professionals since 1987 through National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA). The NCCA Web site states:

NCCA uses a peer reviewed process to: establish accreditation standards; evaluate compliance with the standards; recognize organizations/programs which demonstrate compliance; and serve as a resource on quality certification. Certification organizations that submit their programs for accreditation are evaluated based on the process and products, not the content, and are therefore applicable to all professions and industries.

The best organizations who assess personal trainers have NCCA accreditation. This process, which only 10 fitness organizations have achieved thus far, is an expensive and tedious process. This may put off some newer personal trainers and fitness certification programs, but it is truly the gold standard to earning respect and status in the fitness industry. They maintain educational and test material that covers the most up to date information about fitness, so you know any program that has passed their rigorous tests has the knowledge and practice to do what is right for you. So check your trainer's standard personal fitness certification and additional certifications to ensure that they are from one or more of the following:

- American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM)
- American Council on Exercise (ACE)
- Cooper Institute (formerly known as Cooper Institute for Aerobics Research)
- International Fitness Professionals Association (IFPA)
- National Academy of Sports Medicine (NASM)
- National Council on Strength and Fitness (NCSF)
- National Exercise and Strength Trainer's Association (NESTA)
- National Exercise Trainer's Association (NETA)
- National Federation of Professional Trainers (NFPT)
- National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA)

2. Expectations

When you first meet with a personal trainer, the process should be very similar from one to the other. Succinctly, a new trainer must ask questions about your existing health problems, your history and goals and what type of exercises you prefer. They will probably ask you to fill out a series of forms so this information can be recorded.

A Health History Form will outline any health complaints, disorders or diseases that you have had or are currently suffering from. Family history may also be included so they can get an idea about your risk factors. Always fill out this form honestly and completely to minimize risk of injury or health problems.

The Physical Activity Readiness (PAR-Q) Form helps the physical trainer determine whether doctor approval is necessary before beginning any exercise regimen.

Law requires every personal trainer to have their clients fill out a Informed Consent Form. This former should clearly identify potential risks and benefits of beginning an exercise program. It states that the client accepts these risks and accepts that they may be exposed to physical, psychological or other types of harm. Always read this carefully as it may include clauses about liability.

3. Warnings

As stated above, one a red flag or warning against a particular personal trainer is lack of any type of certification, which signifies that he or she will follow a professional ethics code. However, there are other things you should be leery of and should, perhaps, lead you to hire a different personal trainer.

- First meetings should not include any actual workouts. Exercise sessions usually last 1/2 hour to a
 whole hour. Initial meetings should be reserved for paperwork, questions and figuring out the right
 way
 to
 move
 ahead.
- Trainers should be eager to display or talk about their credentials, references or testimonials from other clients and their history in the field. They should also be able to furnish you with information about their liability insurance. If they cannot do either of these things, it should be a very large red

flag that they are not professional.

- Quality trainers keep up to date with the latest developments in fitness and health science and should be able to adapt their regimens and ideas to suit individuals. If he or she insists that one in particular style of training is the only way to achieve maximum results for every client, you can be assured they are not prepared to work with you and your preferences and ideas. Ideally, they should take classes and study reports from the American Medical Association, Physician and Sports Medicine and the Journal of Sports Medicine among other professional publications to increase and improve upon their knowledge.
- Current CPR and first aid certifications can go a long way to making the personal trainer more attractive to clients. In the fitness industry were injury and body stress is possible, being certified by the Red Cross or American Heart Association is a good idea.
- Perhaps most importantly, once you check all necessary legal certifications and practices, is the shape of the personal trainer themselves. Do they practice what they preach? If they have not achieved health and attractive results in their own body, they may lack the knowledge or motivational skills to help you achieve your own goals.

Transparency

Most of the websites dedicated to Maitland Personal Trainers won't give you any pricing information. Usually it is even impossible to get the info through a phone call. Let's face it, it is usually related to selling tactics. It also gives latitude to charge according to "the mood of the day."
